The Reno Fire Department (RFD) faces significant financial challenges as it strives to maintain a high level of emergency services for the community and surrounding Washoe County. RFD's FY 2024 operating budget relied on \$68,732,869 in funding, with a staggering 94% dedicated to personnel costs. The department's funding is 100% derived from taxes. In addition to personnel costs, fire departments like the Reno Fire Department typically incur significant expenses related to equipment, maintenance, training, and facility upkeep. These expenses have seen a notable escalation over the last three years, largely due to inflation and rising interest rates. Procurement and maintenance costs for firefighting apparatus, such as fire engines, ambulances, and specialized rescue vehicles, have surged due to increasing material and labor costs. Similarly, training expenses, including certifications, professional development programs, and simulation exercises, have spiked, driven by higher fees for training materials and instructor services. Facility maintenance expenses, encompassing repairs, renovations, and utilities for fire stations and training facilities, have also ballooned as construction and operational costs have risen. Overall, the combination of inflation and interest rate hikes has placed immense pressure on fire department budgets, necessitating careful financial planning and resource allocation to sustain essential services and maintain operational readiness. The economic landscape of Reno and Washoe County further exacerbates RFD's financial predicament. Characterized by economic disadvantage and low income, the region has a median household income of \$44,846 and a poverty rate exceeding the national average. About 9.6% of families and 14.4% of the population in Reno are below the poverty line, including 15.1% of those under age 18 and 12.8% of those age 65 or over. Budget considerations are further complicated by legislative constraints, such as the Nevada State Legislature's imposition of a 3% per year cap on property taxes. This cap has stifled revenue growth for local governments, hampering RFD's capacity to address critical expenses, sustain equipment replacement programs, and fund wildfire prevention programs. With a backlog of deferred equipment replacement costs surpassing \$18 million, the department faces hurdles in delivering essential services and addressing wildfire fuel mitigation.

The Reno Fire Department (RFD) serves 110 square miles in the city of Reno, Washoe County, Nevada, directly serving a population of approximately 273,448 residents. Situated in northwest Nevada, Reno's downtown area, nestled in the Truckee Meadows, has emerged as a major technology center, attracting investments from prominent companies like Amazon, Apple, Tesla, and Google. Despite its scenic location near the Sierra Nevada, Reno faces vulnerabilities to natural disasters such as severe storms, wildfires,

earthquakes, and floods, necessitating a robust emergency response infrastructure. With renowned entertainment, dining, and recreational opportunities, as well as proximity to Lake Tahoe and top-tier educational institutions like the University of Nevada, Reno offers a vibrant quality of life. Nestled amidst the stunning landscapes of the Toiyabi-Humboldt National Forest and the Black Rock Desert, the City of Reno finds itself enveloped in a wildland-urban interface. However, this landscape comes with a significant challenge: the ever-present risk of wildfires in the high desert environment. Over the past decade, Reno has experienced a dramatic surge in its population, soaring by nearly 18%. This rapid growth has seen residential neighborhoods sprawling deeper into the wildland-urban interface, amplifying the potential impact of wildfires on the city and its inhabitants. RFD is a career fire department comprising 313 members operating from 14 strategically located stations and a central administrative office. The department's fleet includes 14 Frontline Engines, 2 ambulances, 2 Aerial Apparatus, 8 brush trucks, 9 rescue vehicles, and 27 additional emergency response vehicles, ensuring comprehensive coverage across its service area. With 95% of the community protected by fire hydrants, RFD is equipped to respond effectively to various emergencies, from structure fires to medical incidents and rescues. Over the past three years, RFD has responded to an average of 48,780 calls, including 1,481 NFIRS series 100 calls (such as structure fires) and 30,356 NFIRS series 300 calls (covering medical and rescue incidents). These call statistics underscore the department's significant role in addressing the community's diverse needs and providing timely assistance during emergencies. As the largest and most self-sufficient career fire department in Northern Nevada, RFD collaborates closely with mutual aid and automatic aid partners, including Truckee Meadows Fire Rescue, Sparks Fire Department, REMSA, the local ambulance transport vendor, and State of Nevada. Through these partnerships, RFD offers support in terms of workforce, equipment, and expertise, ensuring a coordinated and effective response to emergencies across the region. With a steadfast commitment to service, RFD remains a pillar of strength and resilience, safeguarding lives, property, and critical infrastructure while upholding its mission to serve and protect the community.
