Lance Ferrato, City of Reno Business Relations Manager, reviewed information regarding this request and stated this is a process that the State uses to maintain licenses.

Mr. Ferrato confirmed for Council Member Brekhus that it has to be consistent with zoning. He also answered questions regarding the current status of their licenses and permits.

Council Member Brekhus stated she is a little uncomfortable that we are issuing a privileged license without an annual business license.

Mr. Ferrato explained that the licenses will be issued congruently. He confirmed that the occupancy reviews have gone through.

Council Member Brekhus stated she will not support this for inadequacy of the record. The record should have included the annual license with all the information she is asking for. We need the public policy that is veering away from unlimited gaming to be advanced and it is not advanced when we are just issuing new non-compliant casinos without following the proper steps.

City Manager Thornley stated that under our zoning rules it is compliant. Planning approved it in the review process. The practice of opening a license for 48 hours or less is common and has occurred since the resort hotel requirement went into effect in the State Statute. The State sanctions it as a way of preserving these relatively special licenses.

Council Member Brekhuis asked for the immediate issuance of the annual license backup material to see the building and planning reviews that went through.

Council Member Duerr noted her support for the proposed augmentations but agreed the quarterly augmentations should be stand alone agenda items.

John McNamara, City of Reno Operations Chief Reno Fire Department, explained for Council Member Reese that the job for the proposed six new positions will be to provide emergency medical services.

Council Member Brekhus stated she will not support the motion. She appreciated that the Fire Chief explained the proposed new positions but there are budgetary issues about how reimbursements work. The medic program needs to come before this body very soon.

Council Member Ebert stated she will support the motion but has concerns about having enough staff to inspect the stormwater retention reservoirs. We need to put a higher priority on that position.

COUNCIL MEMBER TAYLOR ABSENT

City Manager Thornley stated that to his knowledge we don't have any failure point of city owned or controlled infrastructure at this moment. If a retention pond has become a stream, that is a problem. If a detention pond has filled up and water is falling out of it, that is functioning the way it was designed. We need to go out and see exactly what Council Member Ebert is looking at and have the conversation in the field with the subject matter experts about what is happening and if it is functioning as intended.

Leah Brock, City of Reno Associate Planner, gave the staff presentation and answered questions from council regarding the requested zoning change. She also answered questions regarding potential uses for other allowed zoning options.

COUNCIL MEMBER TAYLOR PRESENT

Council Member Ebert expressed concern with potential noise and light pollution if 24 hour operations were to be allowed. She would prefer mixed employment zoning so there is no potential for a use with 24 hour operations.

Council Member Brekhus stated she is troubled with fixing conformity problems by going with the most intense zoning option in a residential setting.

Ms. Brock confirmed for Council Member Brekhus that even if it was changed to mixed employment zoning, the applicant could request 24 hour operation with a conditional use permit before the planning commission.

Ms. Brock explained for Council Member Duerr there are areas where the zoning district was translated to something that no longer conforms with the master plan.

Council Member Duerr asked what the difference is in possible uses between mixed employment and industrial commercial.

Angela Fuss, City of Reno Development Services Assistant Director, suggested having the applicant explain why they are requesting the industrial commercial zoning.

Mike Railey, Christy Corporation on behalf of the applicant, explained they chose industrial commercial because it is less intense than industrial and it matches what is happening in the general area. He also explained their plans for the site.

Discussion on the motion:

Karl Hall, City Attorney, answered a question from Council Member Brekhus confirming that council cannot change the zoning to a lower zoning district than was requested.

Council Member Duerr asked if mixed employment would allow the applicant's plans for a flex space.

Mr. Railey stated he does not know and would need to research that.

Council Member Duerr asked if staff knows.

Ms. Fuss confirmed that the examples for uses mentioned today would be allowed in mixed employment but the applicant wants to look at setbacks and other restrictions that would be applied.

Motion to deny failed and a second motion to approve was made.

Council Member Brekhus stated this could be a lot of truck traffic right outside peoples' bedrooms. I can't believe that when we have so much evidence of issues with truck traffic and light pollution this body is still willing to put 24 hour industrial operation within 200 feet of hundreds of homes.

Council Member Duerr explained her reasons for not supporting the second motion. My preference would have been to continue as was suggested. The applicant may have been fine with changing to mixed employment instead of industrial commercial if they had more time to think it through. Another option could have been SPD zoning.

Council Member Ebert expressed concerns and stated they have the potential now for 24 hour operation because we gave them the zoning change they requested. If we gave them mixed employment they would have had to come to us for a special use permit.
