Summary:

On February 8, 2024, the City of Reno was awarded funding in the amount of \$55,000 from the National Parks Service Underrepresented Communities Grants program. The purpose of this award is to complete a historic context and reconnaissance survey of northeast Reno. The project will generate data that will be used to complete a National Register of Historic Places nomination associated with the city's African American community.

Alignment with Strategic Plan:

Arts, Parks, and Historical Resources

Previous Council Action:

There is no recent Council action relevant to this item.

Background:

In June of 2023, staff submitted an application to the National Park Service Historic Preservation Fund for their Underrepresented Communities Grant Program (URC). The National Park Service's URC Grant Program works towards diversifying the nominations submitted to the National Register of Historic Places. All funded projects must result in the submission of a new or amended nomination to the National Register of Historic Places to include underrepresented communities.

In an effort to include some of the underrepresented history in Reno, the purpose of this award is to complete a historic context and reconnaissance survey of northeast Reno. The project will generate data that will be used to complete a National Register nomination associated with the city's African American community. The project will include contracted services for a historic context of the African American experience in Reno circa 1900 to 1979, a survey of the northeast Reno area, identification of significant properties eligible to be listed in the National Register, and drafting of a National Register nomination associated with Black history. The contractor will seek public participation throughout the project including during the research and identification phases. Final products will be available to the public as a resource. The project overall will support the inclusion of new aspects of Reno's history that will benefit the preservation efforts of multiple stakeholder groups including city planners, developers, historical groups, and the public.

Discussion:

The history of Black people in Reno is underrepresented. There is no in-depth historical context of this community in Reno, Washoe County, or Nevada though the Nevada State Historic Preservation Office (NVSHPO) did commission a statewide African American Civil Rights context that informs the current proposal. Of the 80 designated historic resources in the city, just 5% are located in the Northeast quadrant of the city which was historically a diverse area with the largest concentration of African Americans. Only one designated resource in the entire city is associated with this community and the civil rights movement (Bethel AME Church). The boarding houses that catered to African American divorce seekers, such as the Needham Boarding House at 501 Elko Avenue, and other Black-owned businesses are an underacknowledged aspect of the migrant divorce trade. The sites of protest and gathering places of civil rights activists of the mid-nineteenth century are largely missing from Reno's documented history. This grant project is needed to identify, evaluate, and aid in the preparation of new national register nominations for significant sites that remain unacknowledged today and may also uncover opportunities to amend existing nominations for a more inclusive and full history.

The grant project will support multiple goals of the Reimagine Reno Master Plan, adopted in 2017 and updated in 2021, including the following goals: 7.5B to "identify, recognize, and

increase historic resources by encouraging and incentivizing the addition of properties to the City, state, and national register," 7.5F to "minimize impacts as part of future development to maintain integrity of historical context," 6.6 to "foster a culture of inclusivity- embracing and respecting the diversity of Reno's residents," and 6.6C "engage with the community to identify, preserve, and celebrate places, artworks, and landscapes of cultural significance to the city's diverse population." This grant project will add a new historical context that documents the history of African Americans in Reno and will result in the addition of a historic property associated with this history to the National Register. The grant project will also aid in the identification of additional historic structures or opportunities for additional research to aid in the protection of sites significant to the African American historical context in Reno.

Timeline

February to March 2024 – City of Reno staff will obtain Council approval and proper signatures for grant acceptance. Staff will create and advertise Request for Proposals (RFPs) for distribution to consulting firms.

April 2024 – The City of Reno Historical Resources Commission to review proposals and select a consultant at the April 11, 2024, commission meeting. City staff will ensure the contract is executed with the consultant by the end of the month.

May to July 2024 – City of Reno staff will facilitate 2 to 3 public engagement sessions with community members of Northeast Reno in partnership with nonprofits and churches that are predominantly African American. Staff will share materials about the grant project, City of Reno Historic Preservation, and an overview of the survey and National Register programs. Sessions will be held in Northeast Reno neighborhood locations and also conducted via electronic survey. City staff will identify community leaders to serve in a Northeast Reno Advisory Group.

August 2024 – Hold one meeting of Northeast Reno Advisory Group to meet the consultant, Historical Resources Commission, and City of Reno staff, to discuss the grant project and their roles as advisors. Consultant to give a detailed presentation about the survey and National Register program and process.

May to September 2024 – Consultant researches the historic context of the Northeast Reno area and identifies final boundaries and period(s) of significance for the survey, incorporating information already documented in the state historic context, African American Civil Rights Experience in Nevada, 1900 to 1979, and from the public engagement activities. Consultant records the identified properties on NVSHPO's Architectural Resource Assessment (ARA) forms (page 1 only). Potentially significant historic properties will have additional historical research, and descriptive, locational, ownership, and photographic documentation for completing the full NVSHPO ARA form. Consultant will select one significant historic property, that is

likely to have owner consent, to conduct intensive research and prepare a first draft for a National Register nomination. The consultant will work with City of Reno staff and the Northeast Reno Advisory Group to identify owners who are interested in national historic designation.

October to December 2024 – Consultant prepares final draft of historic context and surveyed property inventory. Consultant prepares an initial draft of National Register Nomination to share with Northeast Reno Advisory Group, property owner(s), City staff, and Historical Resources Commission.

January 2025 – The Historical Resources Commission will review the National Register Nomination at the January meeting and forward it to NVSHPO. NVSHPO has 60 days to review.

April 2025 – Consultant will complete any revisions for the National Register nomination after receiving feedback from NVSHPO, the Advisory Group, and the Historical Resources Commission.

July 2025 – The National Register nomination will be submitted to the National Park Service. The anticipated acceptance of the nomination is September 2025.

May to July 2025 – The historical context and survey will be finalized.

Financial Implications:

There is no cash match required for this grant.

Legal Implications:

Legal review completed for compliance with City procedures and Nevada law.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends Council approve and accept the grant funding in the amount of \$55,000.

I. ADMINISTRATIVE REQUIREMENTS

A. Acceptance of Terms and Conditions of Award

1. Recipients and subrecipients of the Department of the Interior (DOI) financial assistance (i.e., grant and cooperative agreement) awards (awards) must comply with the applicable terms and conditions incorporated into their Notice of Funding Opportunity or Notice of Award. These terms and conditions are in addition to the assurances and certifications made as part of the award application process through submission of the Standard Forms SF-424B Assurances for Non-Construction Programs and SF-424D Assurances for Construction Programs (see <https://www.grants.gov/forms/sf-424-family.html>), or through acceptance of certifications and representations in the System for Award Management (SAM.gov).
2. Acceptance of a financial assistance award from the DOI carries with it the responsibility to be aware of and comply with all terms and conditions applicable to the award. Acceptance of a Federal financial assistance award from the DOI means starting work, drawing down or requesting funds, or accepting the award via electronic means. - O. [35 U.S.C., Title 35, Part II, Chapter 18, Patent Rights in Inventions Made with Federal Assistance](#)). Formerly known as the Patent and Trademark Act Amendments, the Bayh-Dole Act is a federal law enacted in 1980 that enables universities, nonprofit research institutions and small businesses to own, patent and commercialize inventions developed under federally funded research programs within their organizations. The law creates a uniform patent policy among the federal agencies that fund research. The standard patent rights clause is set forth at [37 C.F.R., Chapter IV, Part 401](#) and included as needed at the program and award level.

III. RECIPIENT INTEGRITY AND PERFORMANCE

A. Reporting of Matters Related to Recipient Integrity and Performance

1. General Reporting Requirement. If the total value of the recipient's currently active grants, cooperative agreements, and procurement contracts from all Federal awarding agencies exceeds \$10,000,000 for any period of time during the period of performance of this Federal award, then the recipient during that period of time must maintain the currency of information reported to SAM.gov, the designated integrity and performance system) about civil, criminal, or administrative proceedings described in paragraph 2 of this award term and condition.¹ This is a statutory requirement under Section 872 of Public Law 110-417, as amended (41 U.S.C. 2313). As required by [Section 3010 of Public Law 111-212](#), all information posted in the designated integrity and performance system on or after April 15, 2011, except past performance reviews required for Federal procurement contracts, will be publicly available.
2. Proceedings About Which the Recipient Must Report. Submit the required information for each proceeding that:
 - a. Is in connection with the award or performance of a grant, cooperative agreement, or procurement contract from the Federal Government;
 - b. Reached its final disposition during the most recent five-year period; and
 - c. Is one of the following:
 - i. A criminal proceeding that resulted in a conviction, as defined in paragraph 5 of this award term and condition;
 - ii. A civil proceeding that resulted in a finding of fault and liability and payment of a monetary fine, penalty, reimbursement, restitution, or damages of \$5,000 or more;
 - iii. An administrative proceeding, as defined in paragraph 5. of this award term and condition, that resulted in a finding of fault and liability and the recipient's payment of either a monetary fine or penalty of \$5,000 or more or reimbursement, restitution, or damages in excess of \$100,000; or
 - iv. Any other criminal, civil, or administrative proceeding if:
 - (a) It could have led to an outcome described in paragraph 2.c.(1), (2), or (3) of this award term and condition;

- (b) It had a different disposition arrived at by consent or compromise with an acknowledgment of fault on the recipient's part; and
 - (c) The requirement in this award term and condition to disclose information about the proceeding does not conflict with applicable laws and regulations.
- 3. Reporting Procedures. Enter in the SAM Entity Management area the information that SAM requires about each proceeding described in paragraph 2 of this award term and condition. The recipient does not need to submit the information a second time under assistance awards received if the recipient already provided the information through SAM because the recipient was required to do so under Federal procurement contracts that the recipient was awarded.
- 4. Reporting Frequency. During any period of time when the recipient is subject to the requirement in paragraph 1 of this award term and condition, the recipient must report proceedings information through SAM for the most recent five-year period, either to report new information about any proceeding(s) that the recipient has not reported previously or affirm that there is no new information to report. Recipients that have Federal contract, grant, and cooperative agreement awards with a cumulative total value greater than \$10,000,000 must disclose semiannually any information about the criminal, civil, and administrative proceedings.
- 5. Definitions. For purposes of this award term and condition:
 - a. "Administrative proceeding" means a non-judicial process that is adjudicatory in nature in order to make a determination of fault or liability (e.g., Securities and Exchange Commission Administrative proceedings, Civilian Board of Contract Appeals proceedings, and Armed Services Board of Contract Appeals proceedings). This includes proceedings at the Federal and State level but only in connection with performance of a Federal contract or grant. It does not include audits, site visits, corrective plans, or inspection of deliverables.
 - b. "Conviction" for purposes of this award term and condition, means a judgment or conviction of a criminal offense by any court of competent jurisdiction, whether entered upon a verdict or a plea, and includes a conviction entered upon a plea of nolo contendere.
 - c. "Total value of currently active grants, cooperative agreements, and procurement contracts" includes:
 - i. Only the Federal share of the funding under any Federal award with a recipient cost share or match; and
 - ii. The value of all expected funding increments under a Federal award and options, even if not yet exercised.

IV. FUTURE BUDGET PERIODS

If it is anticipated that the period of performance will include multiple budget periods, funding for the subsequent budget periods that are subject to the availability of funds, program authority, satisfactory performance, and compliance with the terms and conditions of the initial Federal award.

V. TERMINATION PROVISIONS

- A. Per [§200.340 Termination](#), the Federal award may be terminated in whole or in part as follows:
1. By the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity, if the recipient entity fails to comply with the terms and conditions of the award;
 2. By the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity, to the greatest extent authorized by law, if an award no longer effectuates the program goals or agency priorities;
 3. By the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity with the consent of the recipient entity, in which case the two parties must agree upon the termination conditions, including the effective date and, in the case of partial termination, the portion to be terminated;
 4. By the recipient entity upon sending to the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity written notification setting forth the reasons for such termination, the effective date, and, in the case of partial termination, the portion to be terminated. However, if the Federal awarding agency or passthrough entity determines in the case of partial termination that the reduced or modified portion of the Federal award or subaward will not accomplish the purposes for which the Federal award was made, the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity may terminate the Federal award in its entirety; or
 5. By the Federal awarding agency or pass-through entity pursuant to termination provisions included in the Federal award.

VI. FEDERAL AWARDING AGENCY, PROGRAM SPECIFIC TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- A. The Federal awarding agency must include with each Federal award any terms and conditions necessary to communicate requirements that are in addition to the requirements outlined in these general terms and conditions.
- B. Refer to the terms and conditions of the award issued by the DOI sub-agency providing direct funding for the project for performance goals, indicators, targets, and baseline data. The DOI sub-agency awarding project specific funding will specify in terms and conditions additional to those set forth in this document on how performance will be assessed, including the timing and scope of expected performance ([2 C.F.R §200.202](#) and [§200.301](#)).

WASHINGTON –The National Park Service today announced \$1,250,000 to 21 projects in 19 states and the District of Columbia for the survey and nomination of sites and districts associated with communities that are underrepresented in the National Register of Historic Places.

“The National Register is the official list of our Nation’s historic places that are worthy of preservation,” NPS Director Chuck Sams said. “The National Park Service is proud to work with our Tribal, State, and local partners through the Underrepresented Communities grant program to ensure that the National Register better reflects the important places and significant stories of all Americans.”

This years' grants include:

- The survey and development of an LGBTQIA2S+ Historic Context in the Puget Sound, and the National Register of Historic Places nomination of an outstanding representation of queer history in Washington State.
- A migrant farm worker historic context study and National Register nomination in Miami-Dade County, Florida.
- An amendment to the Whitney Plantation Historic District’s National Register nomination in Wallace, Louisiana to rectify the exclusion of African Americans and the site’s role in the history of slavery. More than 350 people were enslaved at the plantation in the 18th and 19th centuries. The updated National Register listing will more thoroughly document this nationally significant site’s history through slavery, reconstruction, Jim Crow, and the Civil Rights era.
- A survey and National Register nomination for the Annie (Nicolai) Wickersham homesite by the Chickaloon Native Village in Alaska, significant for its association with the Dene experience during the first decades of direct Euro-American contact, as well the Prohibition Era experience of the Dene.

The Underrepresented Communities grant program began in 2014 and has provided \$7 million to State and Tribal Historic Preservation Offices and Certified Local Governments to work towards diversifying the National Register of Historic Places through surveys and nominations.

The Underrepresented Communities grant program is one element of the [Historic Preservation Fund](https://www.nps.gov/subjects/historicpreservation/historic-preservation-fund.htm) (<https://www.nps.gov/subjects/historicpreservation/historic-preservation-fund.htm>). The HPF uses revenue from federal oil and gas leases on the Outer Continental Shelf to assist with a broad range of preservation projects without expending tax dollars, with the intent to mitigate the loss of a nonrenewable resource to benefit the preservation of other irreplaceable resources.

Established in 1977, the HPF is authorized at \$150 million per year through 2023 and has provided more than \$2 billion in historic preservation grants to states, Tribes, local governments, and nonprofit organizations. Administered by the NPS, HPF funds may be appropriated by Congress to support a variety of historic preservation projects to help preserve the nation's diverse cultural resources.
